Drug traffickers pose as fishermen

SOUTHWESTERN Peninsula fishermen warned that certain known drug traffickers were posing as fishermen in order to get fishing passes to ply the Gulf.

The fishermen told this to senior officials of the Fisheries Division of the Ministry of Agriculture, Lands and Food Production who journeyed to Cedros and Icaos last week to receive applications for fishing permits from fishermen there. It was learnt that the ministry received over 200 applications for the 60 permits guaranteed under the new fishing agreement between this country and Venezuela. The agreement is still to be ratified by the Venezuelan congress.

A spokesman for the fishermen told the **EXPRESS** San Fernando Desk that at least 10 persons who were known to be involved in the illicit drug trade had submitted applications for fishing permits.

Said the spokesman: "We know that these people will be able to pay their way to a permit. We fear that traffickers will be given preference over bona fide fishermen."

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
