'Steel Bands All Right, But Why This Warfare?' Asks Ramseran

Steelbands themselves are perfectly all right, but why this warfare?" Mr. Victor C. Ramseran magistrate in the Third Police Court queried, as he acquitted four members of the Casablanca steel band yesterday on charges of throwing missiles to the danger of persons on Discovery Day this year.

The defendants were: Carlton Barrow, alias "Zigeelee" of Quarry Street, Ossie Campbell, Kelvin McCollin, and Augustine Mark. Barrow and Mark were also charged with assaulting Norman Joseph with intent to do him actual bodily harm.

Barrow was convicted and ordered to sign a bond in \$50 to be of good behaviour and to come up for conviction and sentence if called upon within two years and to report to the Probation Officer fortnightly during that period.

Mark was reprimanded and discharged as he was already serving a term of imprisonment.

Harold Lewis, who was also charged jointly with throwing missiles, pleaded guilty and was ordered to sign a bond in \$50 to be of good behaviour for two years and to report to the Probation Officer.

"Lewis, Mr. Ramseran declared, "you are the only one who came here as an honest man and pleaded guilty and under the circumstances I am going to put you on a bond."

Mr. Mitra Sinanan appeared for Barrow and Mr. Edgar Gaston Johnson for Campbell. The other defendants were unrepresented by counsel.

Dismissing the stone throwing cases, Mr. Ramseran said, sitting as an individual he had no doubt in his mind that the men threw stones but as a magistrate, he was not satisfied that they did throw stones.
