Mr. Eden spoke in reply to questions provoked by a broadcast yesterday by General Naguib saying that any bid to bring the Sudan into the Commonwealth could invalidate the Anglo-Egyptian agreement on the future of the Sudan. "Immediately after his statement, Mr. Eden through the Foreign Office, asked the British Broadcasting Corporation to make sure his words were broadcast to the Sudan—as General Naguib's were yesterday.

He told the House that what Britain meant by complete independence was made clear to Egypt as long ago as January 9, a month before the signing of the Anglo-Egyptian agreement providing that within three years the Sudan can choose to be independent or to unite with Egypt. We have made plain our position so far as the English language can mean anything at all. By that position we stand and I am not prepared to vary it," he added.—(Reuter).

3 HURT IN CLASH OF STEEL BANDS

3 Hurt in clash of steel bands
Two steel bands clashed on Park Street between St. Vincent and Abercromby Streets about six o'clock yesterday evening when two men and a woman were reported to have been injured as a result.
