'Miss World' Meets The Pan Men

Queens mingle with Steelbandmen and United States Marines in "Carnival Panorama" at the Grand Stand, Queen's Park Savannah, tonight, the first major show in the Carnival Development Committee's quartet of presentations this Carnival.

One of the queens is "Miss World," Miss Carol Joan Crawford, of Jamaica, who arrives Wednesday night for the Carnival as guest of the CDC. She will present the Panorama Steelband Champion with a silver cup donated by Mr. Arthur Bentley.

In turn, she will be presented with a full size tenor pan mounted on a stand as a gift from the National Association of Steelbandmen, by the leader of the champion band.

Also appearing on Panorama tonight will be the United States Marines Drill Squad from the USS Newport News, U.S. Navy cruiser.

Jointly sponsored by the CDC and the National Association of Steelbandmen, Panorama features the eliminations for the "Queen of the Bands" contest for which 35 are entered, and the Steelband championships among eleven finalists.

\$1,000 PRIZE

Winner of the steelband contest will receive a top prize of \$1,000, plus a tape recorder and Mr. Bentley's trophy. Second prize is \$500 and third \$250. Each of the eleven finalists, winners or not, will receive a performance fee of \$100.

The bands will contest in the following order: City Symphony, Starlift, Sputnik Stars, West Side Symphony, Our Boys (Tobago), Guinness Cavaliers (San Fernando), Pan Am North Stars, Modern Surland, Modern Crossfire, Nocturne Fascinators and Coca-Cola Gay Desperados.

Spitfire, due to illness, has been out of the calypso limelight for the past two years and has made just a few guest appearances at the Original Young Brigade tent at Wrightson Road this season.

But the man who gave the public "Post post another letter for Thelma," "29 Port-of-Spain" and "Bow, wow, wow" among many others, is planning a full scale return to the footlights for the 1965 season. Already he has some 12 new hits ready to "leggo."

Spitfire's choices for the Road March are Kitchener's "Mama, this is mas" and Sparrow's "Bullpistle gang." He believes that "Sookie" by King Fighter and "Ko-keo-ko" by Lord Blakie will be popular with the string orchestras.

On the view expressed by some calypsonians that they would have their own tent next year, the old stager had doubts about its success, because the calypsonians of today did not write as the old calypsonians like Lion, Growler, Atilla did.

Profits of the Panorama show will be split 50-50 between the CDC and the Steelband Association. A record number of tickets have been sold for this show, said Mr. Ronald Williams, CDC Chairman, yesterday.

The 2,500 seats of the Grand Stand are all sold out and 1,500 have been sold in the north stand which has a capacity of 2,500.
