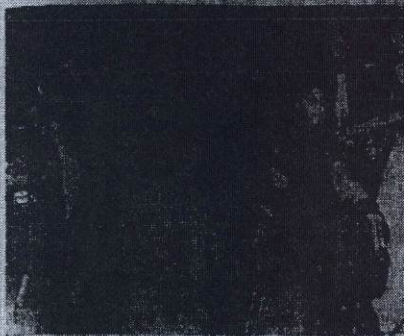


GUIDES AND ESCORTS OFF TO THE WORLD CAMP



The first contingent ever of Guides and Guiders to represent Trinidad at so important an event as the Centenary World Camp to be held in England. Together with others from British Guiana and St. Vincent, the girls sailed on Sunday night on board the Booth liner "Hubert."

PAN-BEATING GIRLS CHEERED ON SAILING NIGHT

As the Trinidad contingent of guides and their escorts embarked on Sunday night en route to the Centenary World Camp at Windsor Great Park, they lustily sang 'Dance the Calypso' to the

accompaniment of a steel orchestra played by a group specially trained in these new musical instruments.

The contingent, the first ever from these parts to take part in so important a feature

of Guide life, was joined by others making the trip from British Guiana and St. Vincent on the Booth liner "Hubert" on which they sailed.

A large crowd of relations and friends gathered at Shed No. 5 on the Port-of-Spain wharves to wish the happy bunch 'bon voyage,' and pleasant camping while selling Trinidad and the West Indies to the world during their stay in England.

Apart from those in the party who have been trained to play their steel pans, others trained by Miss Jean Coggins will demonstrate traditional dances of their country during camp, particularly at the group camp fires and the one for the entire camp.

Most of the 37 girls in the contingent will have a four-week stay, during which they will attend a parade on August 4 which will be inspected by Her Majesty the Queen, visit Westfield College, and be guests of parents of sister guides in various parts of England.

FOR TRAINING

The six escorts accompanying the guides will undergo a short training course at the Guides Training Centre at Foxlease. Five of the guides will remain in the United Kingdom to study or on holiday.

These include Judith Ganseume who will enter a dancing school, Cheryl Greaves who will study physical education, and Elizabeth Ramesar who will enter school in Cornwall.

The group is under the charge of Miss Grace Anderson, Captain of the second Port-of-Spain, and will form part of approximately 4,000 guides from 33 countries and 30 territories taking part in the camp.

Mrs. J. C. Murray, Colony Commissioner wished to thank all those who so generously supported the efforts of the Association to meet the cost of sending the contingent and Government who contributed half of the \$24,000 that had to be raised.
