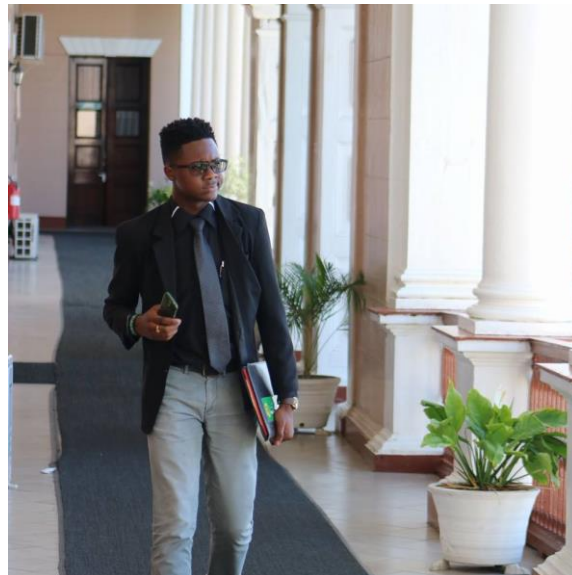

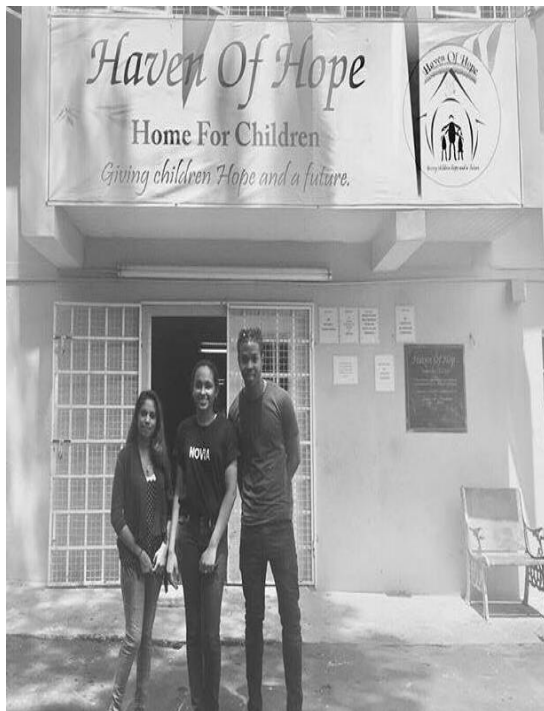


Behavioural Sciences Student Association

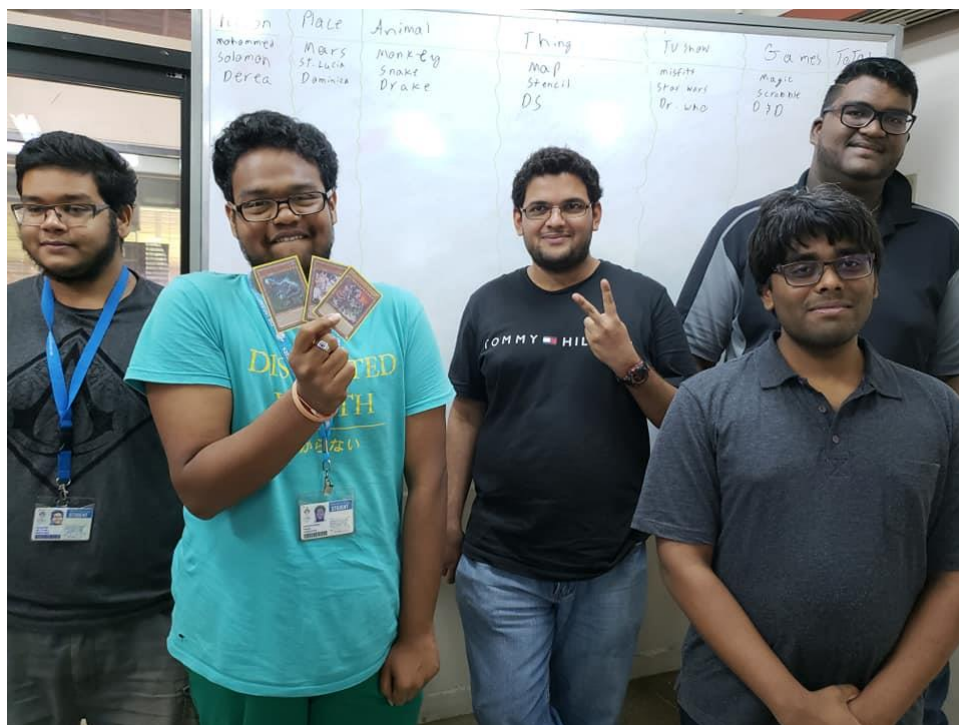

U.W.I Linguistics Society

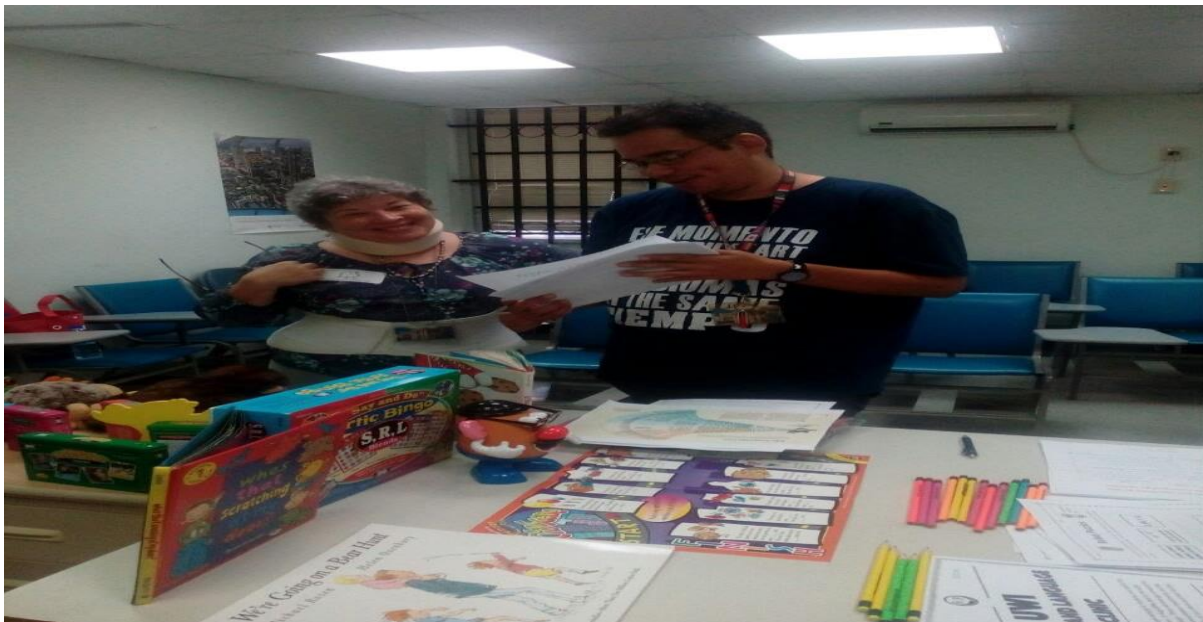

We also engage in activities that actively help to preserve our existing natural environment. One of our main ventures in this area is our annual beach clean-ups on turtle nesting beaches in conjunction with Nature Seekers.



The Society was formerly the Natural History Society, founded by Professor E. Julian Duncan in the 1960s.

In April of 1987 the Natural History Society was revamped and the name was changed to The Biological Society as the society applied to and became the first registered Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) on the St. Augustine Campus of the University of the West Indies.

The executive team at the time were responsible for many forms of conservation work in the country and in 1998 the society was presented with the green leaf award for its work on environmental conservation for the purpose of building awareness. Some of the work included Turtle Patrols, The Biological Society Week, and recycling initiatives for which the society received awards.

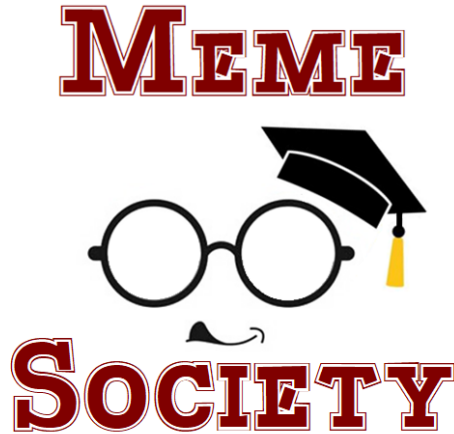

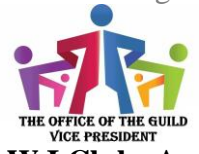

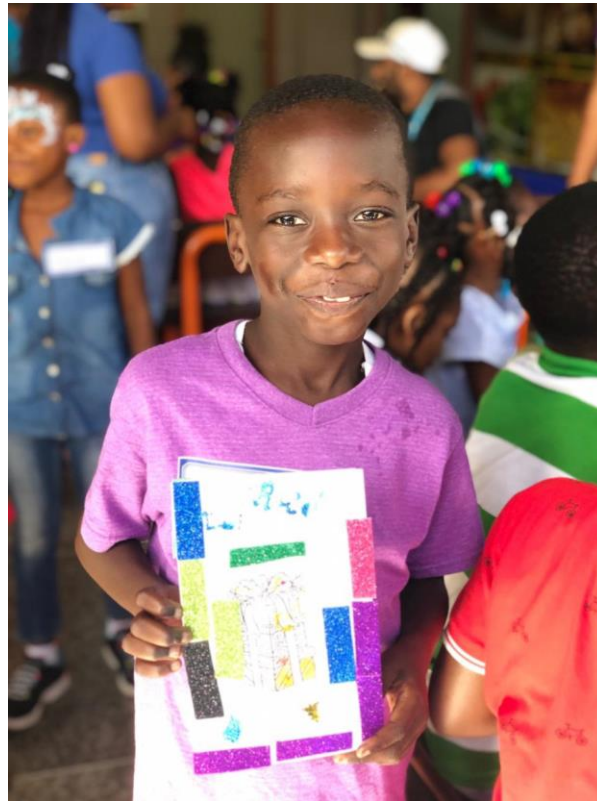
