

Trinidad Scouts beat 'pan' for the Duke

LONDON, Aug. 2 (UKIO).—Trinidad Boy Scouts steel band, playing calypso music, was a highlight of the Duke of Gloucester's tour of the great camp of 34,000 Scouts from 80 countries at Sutton Park, near Birmingham, yesterday after the Duke had opened the World Scout Jubilee Jamboree.

The Duke, accompanied by Sir Godfrey Thomas, Lord Rowallan the Chief Scout, General Sir Bob Lockhart, Mr. K. H. Stevens, Colonel J. S. Wilson (President of the Boy Scouts International Committee), and Major General D. C. Spry (Director of the Boy Scouts International Bureau), stood for a few minutes at the Trinidad camp site and listened to the band.

The Duke returned the salute of the contingent's leader, Ralph

Kelshall, Assistant Commissioner of Scouts in Trinidad, and smiled appreciatively at the music played in his honour.

He waved to other Trinidad Scouts who were chopping wood and cooking on a log fire.

Mr. Kelshall told a U.K.I.O. correspondent: "This has been a signal honour for us. The Duke's tour of the Camp was limited and we are very proud to have been selected for special notice."

The steel band, which first played together on the boat taking them to England, consists of the following Scouts from Trinidad and Tobago: Neville Lewis, Noel Titus, Eric Shah, Mohammed Ali, Rudvin Mohammed, Duncan Jacob, Clive Rustin, Rudolph Clark and Richard Kelshall.
