

Pan Men 'Regret' Clash

Steelband leaders last night expressed regret to Senior Superintendent Gilbert Lashley, officer in charge of Port-of-Spain Division for the clash at Park Street, between two bands.

"Except for that unfortunate incident", said Major G. T. W. Carr, acting Commissioner of Police, "the behaviour of masqueraders and spectators was excellent."

Twenty-one persons were injured in the clash. The most serious hurt was Dieter Rode, a young seaman. His condition was much improved this morning, it was reported.

Policewomen had a very busy time gathering and caring for lost children during the two-day fete. No fewer than 71 children were found in areas in and around the Queen's Park Savannah and in downtown Port-of-Spain.

Apart from that number policewomen had reports of 58 more missing children. Police said today that 39 of them were known to be found. The others may also have been found but their parents had not reported to the police up to noon.
