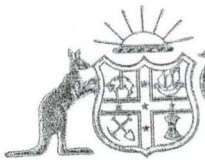

Background information

1960-61 Tied Test

This Test, the first ever tied Test, has a unique and special place in the history of the game.

Played at The Gabba in Brisbane on 9 - 14 December 1960, it was a match that see-sawed in the early stages and then looked destined for a draw.

The West Indies batted first and Garfield Sobers was the pathfinder with one of the finest innings in Australia for years as he plundered 132 on the opening day. The West Indies issued a challenge by scoring 453 in 445 minutes, only to see Australia reply with 505 in 577 minutes, despite being peppered with thunderbolts from speedster Wes Hall.

Australia's answer to Sobers was Norm O'Neill and in a valuable innings he made 181 before being last man out. Bob Simpson, who just missed a century with 92, also contributed strongly to Australia's first innings lead of 52.

The West Indies were unable to repeat the blazing batting of the first innings, mainly due to a magnificent bowling effort by Alan Davidson. He captured 6 for 87 to make his tally for the match 11 for 222 as the West Indies made 284 in their second innings.

Australia had hoped to dismiss the West Indies before stumps on the second last day but were held up by tailenders Wes Hall and Alf Valentine who kept the bowlers at bay again on the following morning as they cut 38 valuable minutes from Australia's batting time.

Australia needed 233 runs to win, but Hall, who had warmed himself up with his batting effort, had other ideas.

In an action-packed start, the dynamic fast bowler sought to blast his team to victory, and he nearly succeeded. Australian wickets crashed as the score crept to 2 for 7, then 4 for 49 and 6 for 92. The turning point in the game came as Benaud, with his jaw jutting out determinedly, strode in to join Davidson and they both started attacking the West Indies bowlers.

Davidson capped off his wonderful bowling effort with a magnificent 80 before he was run out by the amazingly accurate Joe Solomon, who hit the stumps in the first of two fantastically fatal returns.

Then came one of the most memorable last overs in Test history when Hall strained again to bowl his side to victory.

As he charged in off his long run from near the sight-screen for the last over of the game, there were seven wickets down and just six runs needed. The tension was enormous.

The big speedster's first ball struck Wally Grout on the leg, it hurt, but he had no time to worry about it because Benaud called him to run for an audacious single. The second ball was short and Benaud, on 52, unwound an almighty pull shot. He got a faint edge to 'keeper Gerry Alexander and Australia were 8 for 288, still with five runs to get and six balls left to score from.

Ian Meckiff joined Grout. He blocked the third ball, then swung hard at the fourth, missed, but Grout called him to run a quick bye. Four runs were needed with four balls to go and to the next delivery Grout top-edged a hook shot high in the air towards square-leg. Four players converged on the ball, with Rohan Kanhai in a comfortable position to take the catch, but Hall had charged towards square leg from his follow-through and Kanhai dodged out of the way as Hall got his hands to the ball, but spilt it as the batsmen scampered for a single.

Hall's next ball was short and Meckiff unleashed a hook which sailed over mid-wicket, but as they attempted a third run Grout was run out by a sizzling return from near the boundary by Conrad Hunte. The scores were level.

Australia had one wicket left, one run to get and two balls in hand when Lindsay Kline joined Meckiff, and in a desperate mid-wicket conference they decided to run for anything.

Kline clipped Hall's seventh ball towards square-leg with Joe Solomon patrolling the area. Meckiff would have made the winning run if Solomon had cracked under the pressure, but he pounced and unleashed another return from side-on to hit the stumps.

Australia were all out for 232, but amidst all the excitement at the time many of the players and spectators were confused about the result ... it was the first tie after 498 Test matches.

- A media conference as part of the reunion celebrations.
- Selected players to be interviewed live during the course of the First Test for both television and radio coverage.

PARTNERS AND EXTENDED STAYS

As previously indicated, there is provision for those wishing to extend their stay in Australia or for those who wish to bring their partners with them.

Please note, while the ACB would be pleased to offer administrative assistance with these arrangements, the additional cost of any such plans would be the individual responsibility of the person concerned.

There is also the prospect of a fourth product to be developed for the program but this is yet to be finalised. Should the range be extended, full details will be provided.

We are pleased to advise that the minimum guaranteed payment to **each** team is AUD\$33,088. Further, should the licensing program succeed the total potential income for each team will be AUD\$97,333. Each team will receive the same total amount, which will then be split equally amongst the players of that team.

The ACB requires you to sign a consent form approving the use of your name, image and signature on the products identified above. This form will be presented to you upon your arrival into Brisbane.

Cricket greats gather for Mincom Tied Test Reunion Tour

Former Australian captain Richie Benaud and former West Indian vice-captain Gerry Alexander joined many more cricket greats in Brisbane today for the first day of the Mincom Tied Test Reunion Tour.

The tour, which celebrates the 40th anniversary of the 1960-61 West Indies tour of Australia, gathers 11 former West Indies players and 10 former Australian cricketers for five days of public and private events, including the official 500-seat reunion dinner at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre on Tuesday 21 November.

Today, the Australian Cricket Board (ACB) and Queensland Cricket (QC) staged a media conference at the Sheraton Brisbane Hotel and Towers with the former players reminiscing about the extraordinary series – a series that is still credited with reviving Test cricket.

On Tuesday night, the former players are joined by their current day counterparts and a long list of cricket luminaries at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre for a gala dinner. Hosted by leading Australian cricket scribe and broadcaster Mike Coward, the dinner will show rare footage of the series and epic scenes of the tied Test. Some rare and valuable official memorabilia will also go under the auctioneer's hammer.

On Thursday, spectators at day one of the First Ansett Australia Test will be treated to special scenes when the two teams are honoured with an eight-car cavalcade around The Gabba during the lunch break.

Background information

The 1960-61 West Indies Tour of Australia

The West Indies tour of Australia in 1960-61 is widely regarded as one of the game's greatest series. Indeed, it is described by both Richie Benaud and Sir Garfield Sobers as the best series they ever played in.

The five matches were punctuated by a succession of incredible and heroic performances from players on both sides. From the historic tied Test in the first match in Brisbane right through until the final and deciding Test in Melbourne, Australian crowds were treated to a brand of cricket that was both exciting and extraordinary.

Along the way, the series, which Australia won 2-1, saw:

- a drama-packed game in Adelaide as Australia clung on to salvage a dramatic draw on the final day;
- a world record crowd for a single day's play, when 90,800 people packed into the Melbourne Cricket Ground;
- the creation of the Frank Worrell Trophy in honour of the West Indies captain; and
- a civic reception and street parade in Melbourne after the series was over that saw 90,000 people line the streets and cheer the teams.

This was a fantastic boost to the game. The success of the tour was in no small measure due to the close matches, but it really started with the two captains - Benaud and Worrell.

Before the Tests started they both promised to play bright, attacking cricket with the aim of forcing a result at all times.

From an Australian viewpoint Benaud was strongly supported in this attitude by the Chairman of Selectors, Sir Donald Bradman. In fact, at tea on the last day of the tied Test Australia's hopes rested with Benaud and Alan Davidson, who had come together with the score at 6 for 92, and only the tailenders to follow. It was not a strong position, with 124 to get in 120 minutes, but during the interval Sir Donald asked Benaud: *"What are you going for Richie, a win or a draw?"* *"We're going for a win, of course,"* replied the captain. *"I am very pleased to hear it,"* said Sir Donald.

While the West Indies lost the series, they won the hearts of the Australian cricket fans and, true to their word, the two captains played bright and attacking cricket leaving a legacy for Australian cricket that continues through to today.

Who should use this form?

Persons seeking to enter Australia for less than 3 months for business.

You should have adequate funds for your personal support while in Australia and not engage in activities that will affect the work opportunities of Australian residents.

Do NOT use this form if you are:

- ♦ a tourist
- ♦ a religious worker
- ♦ a student
- ♦ working as an entertainer
- ♦ working as a medical practitioner, OR
- ♦ seeking medical treatment.

About the business visitor visa

This is an application for a single or multiple entry visa which provides for a stay of up to 3 months on each arrival. The period of validity for the multiple entry visa is either 1 year, or 5 years or life of passport (whichever is the greater to a maximum of 10 years). An application for a business visitor (subclass 456) visa can only be made outside Australia.

In some instances, the holder of a business visitor visa may not be allowed to make a further visa application in Australia. You will be told if this applies to you when your application is decided. 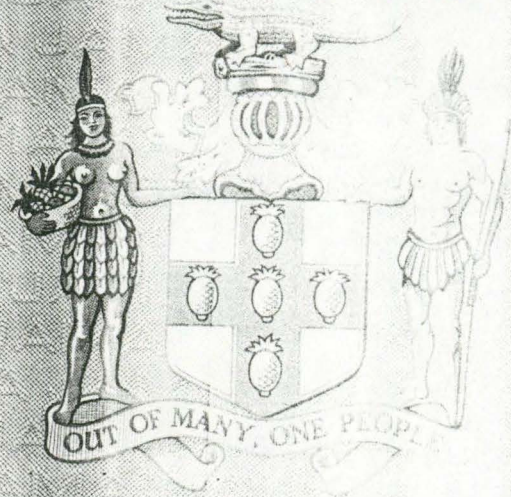

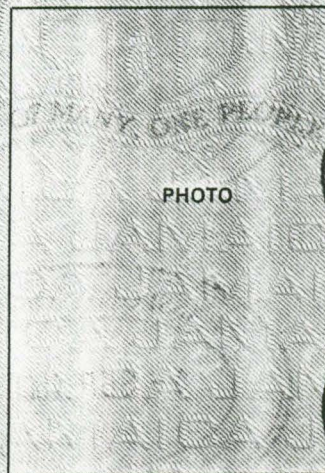

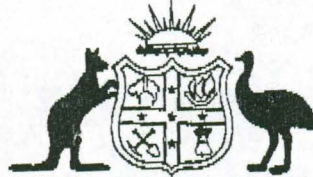
