'A Blue Urban Agenda'

MORE than four million people in the Caribbean and the Pacific are estimated to be living in flood prone areas. As evidenced by the catastrophic hurricanes that took place this year, one in five residents living in low-elevation coastal zones will face threats to their safety, economic output and employment due to sea level rise. Senior lecturer, Urban and Regional Planning Dr Michelle Mycoo of The University of the West Indies (The UWI) and In-

Thinking About Importing Drones and Two-Way Radios to give as Gifts for Christmas?



Do you know?

It is an offence to import, operate or use radiocommunications equipment in this country without certification from the Telecommunications Authority of Trinidad and Tobago (TATT).

Such equipment includes unmanned aircraft systems i.e. drones and two-way radios.

Importation

To import, use or operate any radiocommunications equipment you must first determine whether or not it is already certified by TATT. A list of certified equipment is available on TATT's website, www.tatt.org.tt

If the equipment you wish to import, use or operate is not on this list, you will be required to seek certification from TATT.

Certification Process

TATT's Equipment Certification process begins with filling and submitting Form EC-01, along with relevant documents, by any of the following means:

Form EC-01, which is available at TATT's offices or website www.tatt.org.tt, must be submitted along with the following documents:

- a) A Declaration of Conformity or certification from internationally recognized bodies such as the Federal Communications Commission or Industry Canada.
- b) Specifications from the manufacturer of the equipment.
- c) With respect to drones, a letter of non-objection from the Civil Aviation Authority of Trinidad and Tobago is necessary.

A separate application and accompanying documents are required for each make and model of equipment you wish to import, use or operate.

IMPORTANT

It is an offence under the Telecommunications Act, to operate, use or install any radiocommunications equipment without a licence from TATT.

It is also an offence under the Telecommunications Act, to provide telecommunications and broadcasting services to the public without a Concession.
